We are helping them to build Phase 1 of the Santana Campus in the Dominican Republic, which includes a worship center, dining hall, medical clinic, apartments, and dorms for future missionaries.



House of Palms

Providing ongoing care for the girls rescued from the sex trade and resources to rescue more. These girls are part of an undisclosed community, considered to be one of the lowest "castes" in a traditional class system. They are deprived of basic human rights and are forced into sex trafficking. This girls' home ensures they are cared for in a safe environment away from the negative influences in their community. Most importantly, they learn about God's love.

John Maxwell Equip Legacy Partnership

Empowering Christians to share their faith within circles of influence. This includes supporting the translation of the iLead curriculum into different languages, which will help the next generation develop and practice important values and leadership skills.

Living Word Missions

Helping the unreached people in the Goz Beïda Region of Chad/Sudan in Africa learn about Jesus through Bible classes. Most do not have a Bible, don't know any Christians, and didn't have a missions group helping them up until now.

Messenger International

Translating materials and training local pastors all over the world so they will be uncompromising followers of Christ who transform the world. All resources and tools provided to pastors and leaders come at no cost to them.

Mike Campbell Ministries

Funding for church construction and expansion of ministry in Ghana (West Africa).

Miracle Life Church in Lusaka, Zambia, and Rhema Zambia

Helping to fund land development and the expansion of the Bible school, Rhema Zambia, to train more leaders for the church.

WE ARE OFTEN ASKED, **"WHY MYANMAR?"**



Our journey started in 1943, when a young Army corporal was serving in northern Mvanmar during World War II. He documented his wartime exploits with several black and white photos. That corporal was my dad, and he kept all those pictures in an album. As a little boy, I would ask him to tell me the stories about the Burmese people in the pictures. My dad didn't know it then, but he was planting a seed in my heart that wouldn't come to fruition for more than 30 years.

When I was offered the opportunity to go to Myanmar for the first time, it was supposed to be a nostalgia trip. I wanted to go see where my dad had been during the war. That didn't happen because the mission team we went with asked if we would help them with their ministry. During that trip, we visited fifteen orphanages in six days. That's a lot of kids! They stole Angie's and my heart. At the first orphanage we visited, all the kids were itching themselves until they were bleeding. They had scabies (a skin lice). We were told it was

a communicable disease and then discovered 50 children were sharing five bath towels.

We decided then that we would be the hands of Jesus and purchased every child and worker their own towel. They were so happy! It impacted us in a big way, and we have done this for every orphanage we enter since! This trip placed the desire for us to return to Myanmar again and again. With each returning trip, we would visit orphanages and add to the list of needs of each house. They were basic: toothbrushes, combs, and vitamins. We noticed homes that had sewing machines were in better order than those that did not. One thing led to another; and before we knew it, over a four-year period we had purchased more than 200 sewing machines.

This tool gave each orphanage the ability to make, mend, and sell clothes, while teaching a few girls and boys how to sew. We wanted to empower these kids by giving them "a hand up." We opened our school by renting a house, finding an instructor, and purchasing all the necessary equipment to start a sewing school. We then started reaching out to orphans, trafficked girls, and anyone who wanted to change his or her life. We offer them vocational, money management, and business ethics training-all at no charge. Until last year, we had a three-year waiting list in our rented building.

Because of the generosity of Kingdom Builders, you have helped us to complete our Legacy Learning Center. This building gives us much-needed space, decreases our waiting list, and allows us the ability to add additional training classes. The students are blessed to have this facility. Whenever we hold our annual graduation ceremonies, we have more than 300 people in attendance. Many have experienced homelessness, incarceration, abuse, and addiction. All have experienced serious trauma in their lives. ELP ministers to those from Bethlehem Haven, the Trade Institute of Pittsburgh, Light of Life Rescue Mission, and the Christian Immigration Advocacy Center (CIAC). They've developed a discipleship course to help those in need. Not only is it being taught on a weekly basis with Light of Life but also with community and church Bible studies throughout the city. Some of the tools include forgiveness,

breaking word curses, and the power of worship and inner healing. Through the partnership with CIAC (who provides legal aid), ELP helps women's spirit and soul needs following the trauma of fleeing other countries because of corrupt governments and abuse-related issues.



Meet Victoria. She's from Uganda.

She's married, and at the time she connected with ELP, had three children and a high-level job in banking. She and her family protested the corrupt dictator and were seriously reprimanded. Her mother was poisoned and killed, so her brother took off to England and Victoria fled to America. She was forced to leave behind her husband and children. As she was fleeing, she found out she was carrying their fourth child. She says it was incredibly lonely and isolating delivering her baby here in the U.S. with no family or community. She says she cried every day for a year.

Victoria came to ELP through CIAC. Because of ELP's partnership with Kingdom Builders, Victoria began receiving prayer, counseling, food, furniture, diapers, and formula. ELP partnered her with a godly mentor who

helped Victoria get her work permit. Sh needed a car, and because ELP knows th best partner-the God of miracles-she wa given a free car! ELP is excited to say the Victoria is now working, making friends, ar is in a wonderful church community! It because of the partnership with Kingdor Builders that generations are being change

"VICTORY FAMILY CHURCH HAS BEEN A PART OF MY MISSION AT THE URBAN IMPACT FOUNDATION (UIF) SINCE **BEFORE I EVEN JOINED** THE TEAM.



I first learned about UIF while driving to work one morning and listening to a Victory sermon podcast. The speaker that week happened to be Pastor Ed Glover, Urban Impact's founder. At one point he was discussing UIF's model of relational ministry and describing how the goal is to live life with students and their families.

At the time, I was working as a middle school English teacher in New Castle, PA. I loved every minute I got to spend with my students, but as I listened to Pastor Ed, I realized what I really wanted was exactly what he was describing-the ability to become like family with my students and their families and to minister to them more directly. Several months passed, and I went about my days trying to serve my current students as best as I could; but Urban Impact lingered in the back

of my mind. When the COVID-19 pandemic hit and I was not able to see my students in person, it was difficult. But it also gave me time to really check in with God about what to do next. I had a lot of questions. Was He really calling me away from the challenge of teaching? Could He possibly be leading me away from students and families that I had been building relationships with for years? By this time, Victory had launched their New Castle campus and was doing ministry right in the classroom where I was teaching. Having Victory come to New Castle felt like a direct answer to my prayers for that city, and as I considered a move, I knew it meant the community I had come to love would be left in good hands. I figured the first step was to check Urban Impact's employment page. When I did, there was the perfect position for me-one where I could help students learn to love reading and help them learn how much they are loved by the Lord. After a few rounds of interviews. I sat down and had a discussion with Pastor Ed. We talked about ministry and about empowering young people through literacy, and by the end of it, I knew where I was supposed to be.

As a Literacy Support Coordinator at Urban Impact, I train volunteers to help struggling readers improve their skills and their confidence. Together, we go into schools and work one-on-one or in small groups with students who, for one reason or another, are reading well below their grade level. Our students get the benefit of individualized practice with a science-based reading curriculum, but they also get the benefit of knowing that many adults believe in them and are invested in helping them learn. Over the course of the school year, we see our students grow by leaps and bounds! Reflecting on the 2021-22 year, I think of our student Iman.



to the Gospel. At Urban Impact we call this "bridging." During the school year, students can join us after school at the Tutoring Center where they get tutoring and homework help, a good meal, and an engaging Bible lesson. In the summer, we have our Summer Day Camp. This is one of the best times of the year for us because we get to have fun and help students learn to live out the Gospel every day for eight straight weeks. Beyond the Education Department's programs, we encourage our students to join the many programs that our Athletics and Performing Arts Departments run. Maybe my favorite day of the whole Urban Impact year is at the end of the summer when all the students who have come to know Jesus through these programs have the chance to get baptized in a local lake. It's such a beautiful day of celebrating God's love and the lengths that He goes to reach His children. It's a day that always makes me grateful to be a part of this story and thankful to all of you who also join in this story by being Kingdom Builders.

When the school year started, Iman's teacher feared she would need to do two years of first grade. But by the end of the year, she was reading whole books on her own, and now she's a thriving second grader. I also think of TJ, whose reading assessment scores had improved literally ten-fold by spring of last year. And then there's Zoey, who not only improved academically, but overcame her terrible stage fright by reading a part in our annual Christmas show-Light the Night. She now attends three other UIF programs and can't wait to sing with the children's choir in this year's show. Our team works together with teachers and parents to give students as much support as possible, but in all these cases those teachers and parents thanked us for helping to make it happen. All this academic progress is super exciting because it sets students up for success in the rest of their careers. What's even more exciting is that we can bring these students to programs where they regularly hear and have the chance to respond

Tell us about vourself.

I'm 27, and I'm from New Castle, PA.

What is your favorite food? Stir Fry

If you could travel anywhere in the world, where would you go and why?

Greece. It's always been on my bucket list. It looks like a beautiful area, and I love the history.

What do you like to do for fun?

I love to play sports: baseball, football,

spikeball, volleyball, golf. Anything that is competitive is really fun to me.

How long have you been coming to Victory Family Church?

I started attending Victory in 2016, so I have been here for six years.

Why Victory?

I graduated high school in 2014. I had no clue what I wanted to do. I didn't really know what my passions or strengths were or how to figure that out. So, I tried a lot of different things. In that season, I started attending Victory and 19north (the young adult ministry at the time). I still didn't know what I wanted to do, but I started to feel God turn my heart toward ministry. I ran from that for a while because I didn't feel worthy enough to do ministry and thought that because of my past mistakes God wouldn't want to use me in that capacity. When our former ministry school called "Waymaker" originally launched, I even thought to myself, "There's no way I'm doing that." It wasn't until almost a year later in 2019, I was sitting in main service and Pastor John started talking for the first time about impacting the Northeast and the 1,000-Church Initiative, and in that moment, I felt in my heart God saying, "You're going to be a part of that. I'm going to use you." That night I decided that I wasn't going to run anymore, and I signed up for Waymaker. From that moment on, I told myself I'll do anything God asks me to do and let him use me any way He wants.

What drew you to the Residency Program? Explain why you chose the Young Adults track.

As I was coming out of ministry school, I was looking for a next step. I had a few options, but Young Adult Ministry was where my heart was mostly because that's how I got

introduced to Victory. I felt that the Residency Program would provide me with the perfect opportunity to continue to grow and gain the development I needed.

What are some things you have learned while being in the Residency Program?

I've learned how important it is to guard your schedule and protect (and be sure to take) your sabbath. One thing that is always stressed to us is how important our sabbath is to be a healthy leader. Life can very quickly get busy, and without rest and time in God's presence, we won't have the energy or patience needed to carry us throughout our weeks.

What's something that has impacted you?

One of the most impactful things for me in my time in the Residency Program has been seeing the impact that Young Adult Small Groups have made in so many lives. Leaders are stepping into their God-given purposes, young adults are finding freedom and community, and we continue to see small groups grow each semester. Time and time again, people tell me how they've made many friendships out of the small groups they've joined, and how small groups have changed their lives. It's such an honor to be a part of something that embodies the mission of our church: to help people know God, find freedom, discover their purpose, and make an impact!

You are in your last year of the Residency Program. What would you like to do once it's over?

My goal is to hopefully stay on staff at Victory in some capacity, but more importantly, follow whatever plan God has for me.

Where do you see yourself in five years?

In five years, I hope to have established a

family with my wife and have a few kids and to be leading in whatever ministry position God places me, whether that be a youth pastor, campus pastor, or support pastor. I'm not sure exactly what God has planned, but I know it will be an awesome journey.

What would you say to someone who is weary about applying for the Residency Program? If you are on the fence about joining the Residency Program, I would encourage you to take a step of faith. If you feel like God has called you to ministry, this is the best way to gain experience and to develop into the person and leader you need to be. We'll never be fully ready; we just have to be obedient and faithful.

Tell us about vourself.

I'm 28 years old, and I'm from Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

What is your favorite food?

I like Mexican food.

If you could travel anywhere in the world, where would you go and why?

The south of France. It seems like a beautiful place to me. The Province/Mediterranean mix of cultures seems to lure me in.

What do you like to do for fun?

I like to learn about history, listen to music, listen to podcasts, and watch movies.

Tell us about your walk with God and how it all started.

I didn't grow up in a Christian home. It was a fractured environment. My mom came from a Southern Baptist family, so she was somewhat knowledgeable about the Bible and God. My dad's family was very shattered. His mom had passed away when he was young, which then led to a lot of emotional turmoil in his life. He was an alcoholic and drug addict, and abusive at times, so that didn't lead to the healthiest environment. Eventually, my mom began to look for jobs and housing in Pennsylvania. She didn't tell anyone. In fact, she hid money in her old wedding dress for a month before we left because she knew if my dad found it, he would take it. My mom grew up in Ellwood City before moving to Louisiana. That's how we ended up moving back there, since she was familiar with the area. She did that to give us a better life. To be honest, there was little to no future in Louisiana for me or my sisters, so when we moved to Pennsylvania, it was a fresh start. There was a church in Ellwood where my cousin was the pastor. They were beginning a youth group, and we wanted nothing to do with church. If we did go, we were dragged there. My aunt was on the board, and she really wanted my sister Maddie and I to go. For weeks, we would come up with excuses as to why we couldn't go until we finally ran out of excuses and went. It was the first time we had ever been around believers and in an environment where there are young people who are believers. That began my journey with the Lord. It wasn't until I attended Acquire the Fire Conference (youth conference) in Pittsburgh and there was an altar call, and I remember going down and giving my life to Jesus. I remember worshipping there and worshipping like I never have before. That was the moment when worship became a thing

for me and really impacted me. From there, I What specifically drew you to do the began to pursue music more heavily. Tell us your testimony.

I grew up not going to church. I believed there was a God but didn't fully buy into it. When COVID started and everything was shut down, I began to read the Bible out of curiosity. At first, I didn't understand what I was reading. I had the King James Version and struggled to understand it. When guarantine restrictions began to lift, I was invited to go to church with a friend. It was a Presbyterian church that was too far away for me to consistently go to, and it didn't have anything for students/youth, so I found a church in Washington, PA, where the pastor poured into me, gave me free resources, and helped me take next steps. At sixteen years old I gave my life to Christ, but it took about a year before I really took it seriously and began to grow in my faith. Over time, it became more and more difficult to find a ride to go to church as it was too far for me to walk, and my family didn't support me going, so eventually I stopped attending. During my junior year of high school, I heard about a SOZO Outreach Club meeting after school, and it sparked my interest. At my school, Lincoln Park, there weren't many people that I knew who were Christians, so I was excited to meet people who were hungry for God. Through that meeting, I heard about Victory Family Church. Seeing my fellow classmates' joy and how they lived out their faith drew me in. Even though it was far from me, I wanted to attend their high school ministry, SOZO, so I got a ride with a friend and would eventually even take an Uber because nothing was going to keep me from coming. I began to really get plugged in. I had planned to get baptized after getting saved, but at the time, I was dating a girl who also went to the same church, and my parents thought I only wanted to get baptized because of her. They told me not to get baptized, so I decided to wait. SOZO had baptisms not long

after I began attending, so I finally got to be baptized a year later!

Why do you feel like you're being called to full-time ministry?

When I began serving regularly and getting more involved, I remember a thought popping in my head, "I could see myself doing this full time." I had never considered full-time ministry before. I didn't know what that even entailed. I spent a lot of time in prayer over it. When I was thinking about pursuing ministry, the main thing I saw was the hurt and problems of people close to me. My family and friends were going through a lot, and I knew how much God had helped me, so I wanted to reach out and help others who were going through those problems. I decided to pick the youth track because I know first-hand how vital knowing God is in these times where students are going through all different types of struggles.

What drew you to the Internship Program?

I wasn't planning on going into ministry. I was originally moving back to California with my mom and grandma, had a job lined up, and an apartment. I began praying a lot about what God put on my heart and over time, I felt peace about staying in PA and pursuing the Internship Program.

What are some things you have learned while being in the Internship Program?

The main thing is how to empower other people and knowing you can't do ministry alone. I've learned how to manage my time better. Most importantly, I believe it has helped me to grow in my faith. I am constantly being poured into, the staff is amazing, and the overall community within the Internship Program is close-knit, and we always enjoy hanging out with each other.

What would you say to someone who is on the fence about applying for the Internship Program?

I would definitely recommend it if you believe you're being called to full-time ministry. Pray about it. You're constantly learning new things and being poured into spiritually by everyone around you.
